Working with the Scriptures

April 20, 2008 (*John 14:1-12*)

“Amen, amen, I say to you, whoever believes in me will do the works that I do, and will do greater ones than these...” What are these ‘works’ that Jesus is talking about? How can we know Him?

“Peace be with you.” Barry and Kevin were architects with very different ideas of how the project they were working on should be handled. For the people involved in the meeting it was uncomfortable, even embarrassing. So when Eleanor came up with a third idea for completing the project, one that both men could buy into, they all breathed a sigh of relief. Because Eleanor had listened closely to what each man was saying rather than taking one side over the other, she was able to bring about a peaceful solution that allowed both men to save face.

“Do not be afraid.” Jenny was nine. Her teeth were coming in crooked and the dentist was going to have to pull two baby teeth so that her permanent teeth would have the space to develop properly. Jenny was terrified. “Look at Mickey!” the doctor said, directing the child’s attention to the cartoons on the ceiling and away from the waiting tray of instruments.

“Your faith has healed you.” The doctor saw the cross Beth’s mother was wearing and asked about it. Beth was surprised, since most of the doctors her mother had seen had been far too busy to sit and talk with an old lady, especially about religion. Because of his respect for her faith in God, Beth’s mother had faith in her doctor as well, and her physical condition quickly improved.

Beginning with Genesis, people of faith have wondered what God looks like. And the disciples were certainly no exception. “Master, show us the Father.” “If you know me, then you will also know my Father.” We know Jesus as bearer of peace, as comforter and as healer. “Whoever has seen me has seen the Father.” So what does the Father look like? Perhaps he looks like an architect – or a dentist – or a doctor who takes the time to listen to an old lady’s concerns...

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

is a several-month process for an adult wishing to become a Catholic through the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) or through a Profession of Faith. These rites are celebrated at the Easter Vigil. Please contact Fr. Rich Sztorc.

Infant Baptism

is generally celebrated on the first and third Sundays of the month at 1:00 pm in the Church. The Baptism Preparation Program for parents and godparents, if possible, is held each month. Please call the Parish Office to make arrangements.

Confirmation

preparation begins in the middle of 7th grade and is celebrated during the winter of 8th grade. For adult/high school confirmation, call the Religious Education Office.

The Eucharist

is brought to the homebound by Care Ministers. Arrangements are made by calling Lori Goszczynski. First Eucharist preparation for children begins in 1st grade and is celebrated in the spring of 2nd grade.

Matrimony

arrangements are made by contacting one of the priests at the Parish Office. Arrangements a year in advance allow for adequate reservation time, participation in marriage preparation programs and liturgical planning.

Anointing of the Sick

is celebrated in the Fall during a communal celebration. Special requests for this sacrament can be arranged by calling the Parish Office.

Reconciliation
