You can sign up by filling out a membership slip found near the church exits and turning it in at the Ministers of Praise prayer request box in the alcove near the vigil candle stand. Your prayer brings us closer to the heart and mind of God.

## Eye Witness to History

On the afternoon of May 21, St. Athanasius’s Peace and Justice Committee joined close to two hundred participants for a forum at the Unitarian Church on Ridge. “History and Consequences of US Involvement in Torture” drew from a variety of faith groups and social justice organizations, including Amnesty International and the North Suburban Peace Initiative, and featured Jennifer Harbury, author of “Truth, Torture and the American Way,” and Patricia Bronte, a renowned member of the Chicago legal community, as invited speakers.

As a group, we were prepared to hear the worst. We had all seen the images of Abu Ghraib. We knew that our administration was doing all in its power to prevent any of the Guantanamo Bay prisoner cases from coming to a proper court. Still, we were all shocked at what we were to hear.

Patricia Bronte, an Evanston resident and partner at Jenner Block, is representing, pro bono, multiple clients being held at Guantanamo Bay. Ms. Bronte noted a litany of disturbing details: that only 5% of the over seven hundred men who have passed through Guantanamo were captured in combat by our forces, that the great majority had been picked up by the military in Pakistan (who in turn received the bounty rewards), that only ten have had charges brought against them and that, after four years, none has come to trial. She described the inhumane treatment, detainees held in open cages with no privacy and, until recently, no contact with the outside world, let alone family members, and no idea if they would ever hear what they were being charged with, a situation that has led to many attempted suicides.

Ms. Harbury described the events that led to her gaining national exposure a few years back. Convinced at the time that the CIA was involved in supporting the Guatemalan military dictatorship and believing that they were in a position to save her husband, a Mayan resistance leader, she undertook three hunger strikes outside the White House. She could not save him from being murdered, but she was able to establish that the CIA funded the junta and, specifically, the individual soldiers who tortured her husband.

Rather than let this tragedy overwhelm her, Ms. Harbury explained how she resolved to apply her legal training to fight the system that had killed her husband. Through her tireless efforts for TASSC (Torture Abolition and Survivor Support Coalition) she has been able to raise the awareness level of our government’s breach of international treaties against torture and our own constitution.

Most recently in Geneva she participated in the “United Nations Committee against Torture”. By delivering affidavits of released prisoners that described in graphic and shocking detail water boarding, short shackling, sensory assaults, threats and humiliations, she was able to undermine the administration’s assertion that “we do not torture.” The widely publicized report owed much to her efforts.

All of us who participated in the event felt privileged to witness the stirring testimony of these two outstanding and brave lawyers.

Pentecost 2006

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

The Church rejoices always in the gift of the Holy Spirit. The original outpouring of the Spirit on Pentecost gave the Church her unity and gave life to her mission. Those who heard St. Peter in Jerusalem proclaim two thousand years ago that Jesus had risen from the dead, were given one faith and began to live with one Spirit. One can recite the Creed; but without the Spirit, the words of Scripture and liturgy are dead. One can call oneself a Catholic; but without zeal to introduce others to Jesus, the apostolic mission languishes.

Pentecost is a feast of conversion. Our minds are converted to Christ in faith; and our hearts are converted to his mission in charity. Faith and charity are given with the coming of the Holy Spirit. Everything in the Church is a gift.

In this local Church which is the Archdiocese of Chicago, I hold each of you in my heart as I share with each of you the Catholic faith “which comes to us from the apostles.” (Roman Canon) Each of us is on a path of continuous conversion to the Lord in his Body, the Church. Because the soul of the Church is the Holy Spirit, we are one. Because we are one, the actions of each affect the lives of all. One person’s growth in holiness makes the path to holiness easier for all; another person’s descent into sin diminishes all of us spiritually.

We celebrate Pentecost this year while still suffering from the sins of sexual abuse by some priests. Through your parishes and in other forms, I will continue to keep you informed about what the Archdiocese is doing to meet this scandal. With this note, I want only to express my hope that meeting the scandal’s consequences will not absorb all our energies and co-opt the Church’s mission. I hope as well that the unity that is the gift of the Holy Spirit will not be weakened and our spiritual fervor not diminished.

I have reason for hope in the reports from many parishes that participation in the life of the Church is deeper and generosity to the mission of the Church is greater. I thank all those who contributed to the great success of the Annual Catholic Appeal this year, without which not only the ministry, but the very mission of the Church would suffer.

All of you are in my prayers, that the Holy Spirit may preserve us in unity and let us together taste the joy that is the sign of God’s presence to his people. Happy Pentecost!

## Working with the Scriptures

June 4, 2006 (*Gal. 5:16-25*)

While it's gotten easier recently to talk 'church talk' in the workplace many people are still somewhat put off when the conversation turns to religion. In fact, often, in the world of *business*, there are laws that prohibit talking about Scripture and the world of *religion*. Unfortunately, however, some words from Scripture pass more easily than others from one world to the other. "[I]mmorality, impurity, lust, idolatry, sorcery, hatreds, rivalry, jealousy, outburst of fury, acts of selfishness, dissensions, factions, occasions of envy, drinking bouts, orgies, and the like." In fact some people might say that, with the possible exception of 'sorcery', this list provides a pretty good description of their workplace!

Happily, however, there are also other words. "[L]ove, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control." Paul's reminder that "...against such there is no law..." is as valid today as it was two thousand years ago. These words are welcome in any workplace. We see them lived out in workers who love what they do and appreciate those with whom they work, in artists who bring joy and beauty into the world, in teachers who practice patience in the classroom, in social workers who serve the poor and marginalized with kindness, in mentors who generously share their wisdom and expertise, in men and women who remain faithful to their commitments and relationships, in hospice workers who gently accompany the dying, and in newscasters who practice self-control in reporting, rather than sensationalizing, the news.

Modern psychology has introduced us to the concept of selfish egoism – that which is centered on one's own pleasure to the exclusion of any concern for others. Paul's letter includes a fairly comprehensive list of attitudes and behaviors that might fall into this category. But Paul doesn't leave it there. He goes on to invite his followers to practice that charity which is the very breath of life (the "Spirit") in a Christian community. Take a look around your workplace – whether it's miles away or right in your own home. What are people talking about? What world do they live in? What words are they using?

is brought to the homebound by Care Ministers. Arrangements are made by calling Razia Khokhar. First Eucharist preparation for children begins in 1st grade and is celebrated in the spring of 2nd grade.

## Matrimony

arrangements are made by contacting one of the priests at the Parish Office. Arrangements a year in advance allow for adequate reservation time, participation in marriage preparation programs and liturgical planning.

## Anointing of the Sick

is celebrated in the Fall during a communal celebration. Special requests for this sacrament can be arranged by calling the Parish Office.

## Reconciliation

is celebrated on Saturdays, after the 8:15 am Eucharist until 9:30 am, in the sacristy near the front doors of the Church during the Holy Hour. Communal Reconciliation Services are held during Advent and Lent.
