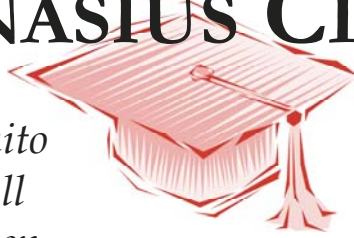

The Generations Campaign

A legacy for generations—help us reach our goal!

BACKGROUND: On October 25–26, 2008, St. Athanasius Parish launched our *Generations Campaign* with a goal of \$3 million and three clearly-defined components...

Church repairs at an estimated cost of \$2,000,000
Lindley Park acquisition at a cost of \$600,000
Maintenance Fund establishment at a cost of \$400,000

RESPONSE: To date, 481 of our registered members have offered their financial support to this important effort resulting in pledges and gifts of \$2,818,667. Additional responses included 46 “unspecified” commitments (individuals who stated they would definitely give but did not confirm an amount or timeline – these have not yet been received) and 177 refusals.

REPAIRS: When dealing with an aging structure, unanticipated problems frequently occur. Unfortunately, this was the case with our Church as waterlogged columns were discovered and brittle sacristy walls required immediate attention. To fully address these – and other – unexpected repair issues resulted in an additional cost of almost \$350,000. (A detailed accounting of all work completed on the Church can be found on the St. Athanasius website.)

LINDLEY PARK: The final payout for this expansion to our Parish footprint was made in December, 2010, officially making this green space a permanent part of our campus.

TOTAL COSTS: As of May 18, 2011, Church repairs, Lindley Park, campaign expenses and loan interest total \$2,955,497. While a few gifts were restricted for the maintenance fund, due to the overrun in repair costs and underfunding of the campaign goal, this component, realistically, may not be realized.

CONCERNS: While we are confident that everyone who made a commitment to the campaign had every intention of fulfillment, we currently have more than \$100,000 in pledges and gifts without a first payment submitted. We understand that circumstances may have changed, so the campaign office is now attempting to confirm which of these promises are still viable.

NEXT STEPS: St. Athanasius leadership made the decision that 2010 would be a year of “rest” for the campaign. Our thanks to those individuals who have been faithfully and consistently sending in payments toward your three-year commitments. With the pledge period now drawing to a close and much to do to cover our current costs, we will continue to search for ways to reach the goals of our *Generations Campaign*. Please watch the bulletin and your mail for new opportunities to help successfully complete this very special initiative.

Gospel for June 12, 2011

Pentecost Sunday

John 20:19-23

ON THE EVENING of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained."



After reading the Gospel aloud, in unison, those gathered reflect on the following questions:

- In this passage, what word, phrase or image struck you?
- How does that speak to you personally?
- How does that speak to our community at St. Athanasius? And to the wider Church?

*Conclude by praying the **Our Father** together.*

For further reflection: On Pentecost we will celebrate the birthday of the Church, the coming of the Holy Spirit to empower we who are to carry on Jesus' mission. The central command of Peace stands out so clearly. We must seek our power in PEACE .

Class of 2011 at May Crowning



When a woman admitted she had a drinking problem and needed help, the truth opened the opportunity for healing within her and within her family. The truth of her situation set her (and the family) free. The truth required a different pattern of living with ongoing assessment. When she died last year after 31 years of sobriety, the family remarked how important her embracing the truth years prior was for everyone. It made all the difference. Another way we meet the Risen Lord occurs when truth has access to our thinking, forms our will and patterns our life.

When truth patterns our life, our life is free. “What is truth?” Pilate asked Jesus. The correct question is “Who is truth?” The answer: Jesus is truth (and the life and the way). When He is chosen, patterns of an abundant life emerge. And these patterns reveal a free woman, a free man. We see that there is right and wrong; we realize forgiveness frees us from revenge; we discover that relationships have requirements which we need to choose. We are, first, child of God, then brother/sister, married, parent and member of the human race. Our relationship with God is who we are and the source of freedom.

And so we remain faithful to a spouse; we tell the truth; we honor our parents; we resist the obsessive ‘having’ of goods and relationships; we acknowledge God regularly (weekly and daily); we have a single core and most freeing conviction: God’s presence. Yes, embracing the Ten Commandments provides a free direction no one can take away from us. The commandments of Mt. Sinai tell us our freedom centers on love of God and neighbor in very specific ways.

The Risen Lord opens the pattern of love for each of us and all of us. When the Risen Christ holds us, we are held in freedom. For when we try to hold ourselves or we allow some-thing or some-one else to hold us, we become enslaved, no longer free. The pattern of a disciple, following the Risen Lord along with a band of disciples, exudes free men and women. We live in the moment and are not captured by the moment. Acknowledging frailty and vulnerability becomes the source of free people, not an embarrassment from which we need to hide.

The closer we are to the truth, the closer we are to freedom. There is truth about our individual lives and there is truth about our human lives. In both instances, when that truth is the Risen Christ, we are free indeed!

Accept that He is Risen for you! Pray: Christ, be our light!

Working with the Scriptures

June 2-5, 2011 (*Acts 1:1-11; Mt. 28:16-20*)

“[G]o, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing...teaching...” What must the disciples have been feeling? They had been devastated by Jesus death and when “He presented himself alive to them...” they were overjoyed. But now He was really gone – and they were scared. They didn’t know what to do.

Tim was an associate at the law firm. When he was assigned to take the lead on a large tax case he felt proud that the firm had this much confidence in him. But secretly, even though he researched case law and prepared his arguments, he hoped that there would be a senior attorney assigned to catch anything he might miss. He didn’t want to admit it, even to himself, but he was scared, and when the department head told him that he would be handling the case alone he felt like a deer in the headlights. “Don’t just stand there,” the department head said. “You’ve done your homework. Now go out there and put what you’ve learned into practice.” Later Tim would look back and wonder, if there had been a senior partner in charge would he ever have had the confidence to step out on his own?

You might say that the disciples were Jesus’ ‘associates’. They remembered all that He had said, all the “...instructions” He had given. But, like Tim, when Jesus disappeared from their sight they were scared. Then “...two men...stood beside them...” and, like Tim’s department head, asked, “...why are you standing there...?” Now it was their turn to “...make disciples of all nations...” to “...baptize...” and to “...teach...”

And so they did. Today what Jesus handed on to His disciples has been handed down to us and it is we who stand looking at the sky wondering what we’re supposed to do. And Jesus gives us the same answer He gave them. We are to do what He did. But unlike Tim, who had to handle the case by himself, Jesus assures us that we won’t be alone – because He will be with us “...always, until the end of the age.” Court’s in session. How are we doing?

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

is a several-month process for an adult wishing to become a Catholic through the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) or through a Profession of Faith. These rites are celebrated at the Easter Vigil. Please contact Fr. Rich Sztorc.

Infant Baptism

is generally celebrated on the first and third Sundays of the month at 1:00 pm in the Church. The Baptism Preparation Program for parents and godparents, if possible, is held each month. Please call the Parish Office to make arrangements.

Confirmation

preparation begins in the middle of 7th grade and is celebrated during the winter of 8th grade. For adult/high school confirmation, call the Religious Education Office.

The Eucharist

is brought to the homebound by Care Ministers. Arrangements are made by calling Lori Goszczyński. First Eucharist preparation for children begins in 1st grade and is celebrated in the spring of 2nd grade.

Matrimony

arrangements are made by contacting one of the priests at the Parish Office. Arrangements a year in advance allow for adequate reservation time, participation in marriage preparation programs and liturgical planning.

Anointing of the Sick

is celebrated in the Fall during a communal celebration. Special requests for this sacrament can be arranged by calling the Parish Office.

Reconciliation

is celebrated on Saturdays, after the 8:00 am Eucharist until 9:30 am, in the sacristy near the front doors of the Church during the Holy Hour. Communal Reconciliation Services are held during Advent and Lent.
