School Advisory Board Elections This Weekend

Elections for the St. Athanasius School 2010-2011 School Advisory Board will be held this weekend to fill vacancies due to the expiring term of four existing members. The board is advisory to the principal and pastor, who participate in all deliberations of the board, with the pastor having final approval of all board decisions. Once confirmed, the new members will serve for a three year term beginning July 1, 2010, and will join the eight returning members to make up the twelve person school advisory board.

Ballots will be available in the pews during Sunday morning worship and will be collected in a ballot box near the entrance to the Church. Pursuant to the board bylaws, in the case of any dispute, contest, or voting irregularity, the decision of the current board Chairperson shall be final and binding on all. The nominating committee of the current board is pleased to present the following slate of candidates for the open positions:

Jane Alexander Berkley and her husband John have three children attending St. A's, Alex (7th grade), Jack (5th grade) and Frank (3rd grade), and their daughter Ryan is a graduate of the St A's class of 2010. Jane joined the parish 3 years ago. Following graduation from Florida State University, Jane worked in the financial industry: first on the floor of the Options Exchange, and then as an officer in Sales and Marketing for John Nuveen. More recently, she has been involved in local politics and public school development. As a graduate of Leadership Evanston, she has chaired the election campaigns for 2 candidates – one for Alderman and one for District 202 school board. Jane was an officer for the PTA Council in D65 as well as a member of its Differentiation and Enrichment Committee. Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Jesus:

On this Feast of the Most Blessed Trinity, we reflect on how God's mysterious unity is shared by three Divine Persons. That divine unity in relationship anchors our life as Christ's disciples in his body, the Church. Recently, our unity, our relationships are strained anew by reports of the sexual abuse of young people by priests and bishops. I have been encouraged to speak to you today by those whom I have recently consulted including the Council of Priests, the Archdiocesan Women's Committee, the wives of the deacons ordained just last week and many others.

First of all, these stories are about victims, young boys and girls, who were taken advantage of by those in whom they and their families had placed complete trust. Even though the abuse took place twenty to thirty or more years ago, the damage is long lasting and often devastating, and their pain affects all who are with them in the Church. I have spoken with dozens of adult survivors of sexual abuse and sometimes also with members of their families. I have tried to listen and have offered apologies, but the primary concern that all victims share is that no one else ever be abused as they were.

Victims have frequently blamed themselves or have felt alone and shamed. We owe a debt of gratitude to the groups that have assured victims that they are not the only ones who were abused. The Archdiocesan Office for the Protection of Children and Youth was formed so that victims can continue to be accompanied for as long as it is helpful. The healing garden is now being planned adjacent to Holy Family Church on Roosevelt Road with involvement by the victims/survivors. It promises to be a help for achieving personal peace and reconciliation and will be one means of assuring that this crisis will have a permanent impact on pastoral life.

So that all children will be safe, the Archdiocese has instituted training for adults to watch for signs of abuse in children. This training is mandatory for bishops, priests, deacons, teachers, youth ministers and all those, even volunteers, who are in frequent contact with children. Children themselves in our schools and religious education programs have been shown how to recognize and report any advance that makes them uncomfortable. Every report of sexual abuse of a minor, no matter when it is said to have taken place, is reported to the civil law enforcement authorities by the Archdiocese. No priest against whom an allegation of sexual abuse of children has been sustained is in ministry in the Archdiocese of Chicago.

Mistakes have been made here and elsewhere, even as we have learned much and tried to integrate our learning into an ever-expanding healing environment. I cannot speak with any personal knowledge of the situation outside of the United States, but I can say that Pope Benedict the XVI now and before he was elected Bishop of Rome was always clear in his resolve that the priesthood must be purified of any sexual predators and that prayers for the victims should be part of our lives.

I hope and pray that God will strengthen and heal those who have been abused sexually by priests or anyone else. The Archdiocese continues to ask those who have suffered abuse to come forward. Contact information is available on the Archdiocese of Chicago's webpage. The phone number of the Office for the Protection of Children and Youth is published in parish bulletins and in the *Catholic New World*.

We believe that God can bring good out of evil. He can heal victims and grant forgiveness to those who repent of the crime of sexual abuse or any other sin. We stand before the mystery of God's inner life today and we pray that the love that is God's nature may be more fully shared among us now. You are in my prayers and I ask for yours. God bless you.

Gospel for June 13, 2010

Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Lk 7: 36-50

A Pharisee invited Jesus to dine with him, and he entered the Pharisee's house and reclined at table. Now there was a sinful woman in the city who learned that he was at table in the house of the Pharisee. Bringing an alabaster flask of ointment, she stood behind him at his feet weeping and began to bathe his feet with her tears. Then she wiped them with her hair, kissed them, and anointed them with the ointment. When the Pharisee who had invited him saw this he said to himself, "If this man were a prophet, he would know who and what sort of woman this is who is touching him, that she is a sinner." Jesus said to him in reply, "Simon, I have something to say to you." "Tell me, teacher," he said. "Two people were in debt to a certain creditor; one owed five hundred days' wages and the other owed fifty. Since they were unable to repay the debt, he forgave it for both. Which of them will love him more?" Simon said in reply, "The one, I suppose, whose larger debt was forgiven." He said to him, "You have judged rightly."

Then he turned to the woman and said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? When I entered your house, you did not give me water for my feet, but she has bathed them with her tears and wiped them with her hair. You did not give me a kiss, but she has not ceased kissing my feet since the time I entered. You did not anoint my head with oil, but she anointed my feet with ointment. So I tell you, her many sins have been forgiven because she has shown great love. But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves little." He said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." The others at table said to themselves, "Who is this who even forgives sins?" But he said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace."



After reading the Gospel aloud, in unison, those gathered reflect on the following questions:

- In this passage, what word, phrase or image struck you?
- How does that speak to you personally?
- How does that speak to our community at St. Athanasius? And to the wider Church?

*Conclude by praying the **Our Father** together.*

Scripture Question of the Week

This Gospel seems so far removed from our reality, but is it? Jesus respects those who step outside of social conventions to speak truth to power. Would we have the courage to do that, even at a dinner party?

Working with the Scriptures

June 6, 2010 (Lk. 9:11b-17)

“Give them some food yourselves.” Jesus’ response to his disciples sounds almost harsh. After all, they were just trying to help. The only logical thing to do was to tell the people that dinner was “on their own” (many church and business conferences in our own time operate this way). The disciples were just being “practical.” But Jesus seemed to have something else in mind...

It was Saturday afternoon and, officially, the office was closed. The big meeting was scheduled for Monday. Susan would be making the first presentation. Representatives were coming in to the home office from around the country. Susan was just putting the finishing touches on her Power Point presentation when it happened – her computer crashed! All of her handouts – her charts and profiles – were gone, just like that. She tried calling her Department Head at home, but got only an answering machine: “In case of emergency please, call Susan Duffy.” A lot of good that would do her - she *was* Susan Duffy! Who could *she* call?

A couple of people from her design and development team were also in the office and overheard the message Susan was leaving on her boss’s answering machine. They came over to her desk to ask what was wrong. When she told them what had happened they started coming up with ideas of how they could retrieve information, break it down into its component parts and begin to reconstruct the presentation. By the time they were finished (several hours later) Susan had a better presentation than the one she’d been working on alone. Susan’s co-workers’ gifts of time, energy and skill had saved the day.

Jesus didn’t solve the disciples’ problem for them. Nor did he let them pass the problem on to the crowds. Instead, He seemed to be telling them, “You have within you all the resources you need – and more.” Sometimes that’s how God answers *our* prayers, too. “In case of emergency, call _____.” “Give them something to eat yourself.” Are we willing to share our time, energy and skill? Or do we, like the disciples, still expect God to work the miracle?

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

is a several-month process for an adult wishing to become a Catholic through the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) or through a Profession of Faith. These rites are celebrated at the Easter Vigil. Please contact Fr. Rich Sztorc.

Infant Baptism

is generally celebrated on the first and third Sundays of the month at 1:00 pm in the Church. The Baptism Preparation Program for parents and godparents, if possible, is held each month. Please call the Parish Office to make arrangements.

Confirmation

preparation begins in the middle of 7th grade and is celebrated during the winter of 8th grade. For adult/high school confirmation, call the Religious Education Office.

The Eucharist

is brought to the homebound by Care Ministers. Arrangements are made by calling Lori Goszczynski. First Eucharist preparation for children begins in 1st grade and is celebrated in the spring of 2nd grade.

Matrimony

arrangements are made by contacting one of the priests at the Parish Office. Arrangements a year in advance allow for adequate reservation time, participation in marriage preparation programs and liturgical planning.

Anointing of the Sick

is celebrated in the Fall during a communal celebration. Special requests for this sacrament can be arranged by calling the Parish Office.

Reconciliation

is celebrated on Saturdays, after the 8:15 am Eucharist until 9:30 am, in the sacristy near the front doors of the Church during the Holy Hour. Communal Reconciliation Services are held during Advent and Lent.
