Summer Hospitality after Masses

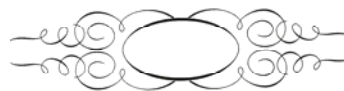

Over the Rainbow, I've Got the World on a String, Stormy Weather, That Old Black Magic, Let's Fall In Love, The Man That Got Away, Ac-cent-tchu-ate the Positive, Come Rain or Come Shine - these are just some of the familiar, wonderful tunes that you'll enjoy in this musical revue of Harold Arlen's music. Harold Arlen wrote the melodies to all of these songs, along with lyricists like Ira Gershwin, Johnny Mercer, Ted Koehler, "Yip" Harburg, and others. Harold Arlen wrote music for movies, The Cotton Club in Harlem, and for many Broadway Musicals of the '30s and '40s. Our own Music Director, Steve Carson, is playing for this tuneful cabaret revue at the No Exit Café, 6970 N. Glenwood Avenue in Rogers Park. The show runs Fridays and Saturdays at 8:00 pm and Sundays at 7:00 pm, from **June 25** through **August 8**. Tickets are \$25 on Fridays and Sundays and \$30 on Saturdays. Greetings from the Dominican Republic

As you may assume, I made it here safe and sound. The filter program here is awesome! I've been working in the facility every day, doing everything from making filters to firing wood kilns. I work from 8 am until 12 pm, take a siesta for an hour or so, and work again until 6 pm. The work here involves a lot of manual labor; I can feel my muscles getting bigger every day! The man who runs the facility is an artist named Radhames Carela. He's famous in the Dominican Republic and he's teaching me how to throw on a wheel in my free time.

I live with a woman named Elena. She's Radhames' sister and helps with the filter project by housing interns. She does my laundry and cooks for me so I don't have to worry about those things while I'm here. I have my own bedroom. They don't have running water half the time, so I bathe out of a bucket.

Along with working in the ceramic filter facility, I helped translate and teach two Haitian men how to make filters for their facility in Jacmel, Haiti. After their training, we went to Haiti to help them build a kiln.

The poverty here is dumbfounding. I'm living in an area that would be considered poor by American standards, but is actually middle class by Dominican standards. I've visited communities without running water or electricity. The people drink polluted yellow water from a nearby river (hence the importance of the filters!), and the only innovative technology they have is a spigot that pumps water up from the river... sometimes. The girls living in these compounds are consistently pregnant by the age of 13 or 14, and the school system is so lagging that a high school diploma is equal to an 8th grade level of learning. Not many people get that diploma.

As you can imagine, Haiti is even worse. There is no semblance of government whatsoever. There is no sewage or clean water; electricity is rare. Most of the buildings in every city are condemned. A lot of collapsed buildings haven't even been excavated yet. The homeless population is a least 500,000. Those receiving aid have tents or tarps, and communities without aid live in huts made from bedsheets and scraps of cloth. EVERYONE is poor.

And yet, the resilience of the Haitian people is so astounding! Dozens of aid organizations are employing Haitians to do construction work, and some people are even doing it without the incentive of pay. People are re-using old concrete and rebar for new buildings and reclaiming metal and wood to make everything from bedframes to school desks to wheelchairs.

I'm working on a photobucket account, but the internet here is incredibly slow, so please be patient! I hope you are all well and I will let you know more about my trip later.

Gospel for June 27, 2010

Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Lk 9: 51-62

When the days for Jesus' being taken up were fulfilled, he resolutely determined to journey to Jerusalem, and he sent messengers ahead of him. On the way they entered a Samaritan village to prepare for his reception there, but they would not welcome him because the destination of his journey was Jerusalem. When the disciples James and John saw this they asked, "Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to consume them?" Jesus turned and rebuked them, and they journeyed to another village.

As they were proceeding on their journey someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." Jesus answered him, "Foxes have dens and birds of the sky have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to rest his head."

And to another he said, "Follow me." But he replied, "Lord, let me go first and bury my father." But he answered him, "Let the dead bury their dead. But you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." And another said, "I will follow you, Lord, but first let me say farewell to my family at home." To him Jesus said, "No one who sets a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God."



After reading the Gospel aloud, in unison, those gathered reflect on the following questions:

- In this passage, what word, phrase or image struck you?
- How does that speak to you personally?
- How does that speak to our community at St. Athanasius? And to the wider Church?

*Conclude by praying the **Our Father** together.*

Scripture Question of the Week

Jesus shows, once again, an example of mercy toward those who do not welcome him and, again, a tone of urgent demand toward his followers. Jesus does not expect us to abandon our family bonds, but if they prevent us from being ourselves in relation to God's call, then we should consider them carefully. To care for others, we must care for ourselves. Do we take the time and space we need for our own spiritual growth?

Working with the Scriptures

June 20, 2010 (*Gal. 3:26-29; Lk. 9:18-24*)

“Who do you say that I am?” The receptionist who greets you when you visit your doctor’s office; the mechanic who works on your car; the clerk in the grocery store; the bank teller. Do you know their names? Who do you say that they are? Paul tells us that we are all one in Christ Jesus. There is to be no distinction. We are the church, the Body of Christ. “Who do you say that I am?”

Driving through a rather upscale suburban neighborhood outside Chicago one summer afternoon, I was struck by the fact that most of the houses stood silent. There were no children playing basketball off garage doors or riding their bicycles down the street, no cars in the driveways, no open windows or doors. The only activity seemed to be the busy coming and going of the landscaping teams – men, mostly Hispanic, cutting grass, clipping hedges and manicuring lawns where no self-respecting dandelion would ever dare make an appearance. I suspected that the owners of most of these grand homes were off making a living, commuting downtown early in the morning and returning late in the evening. And I wondered if they even knew the names of the people who inhabited their neighborhood during the day.

“Who do you say that I am?” I am the butcher who cuts your meat. I am the housekeeper who makes sure there’s fresh coffee prepared for your meetings. I am the janitor who mops the office floor every night after you leave. I am the window washer who hangs 30 stories above the ground. I am the lineman ensuring that you have electricity in your home, the driver of the hook and ladder screaming around the corner, the police officer staring down a teen with too much time on his hands. I am the Body of Christ sitting on the next park bench over from yours. I am German and Pole, Norwegian and Swede, African and Hmong, Oneida and Chippewa, Christian and Jew, Arab and Greek. I am the Body of Christ. “Who do you say that I am?”

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

is a several-month process for an adult wishing to become a Catholic through the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) or through a Profession of Faith. These rites are celebrated at the Easter Vigil. Please contact Fr. Rich Sztorc.

Infant Baptism

is generally celebrated on the first and third Sundays of the month at 1:00 pm in the Church. The Baptism Preparation Program for parents and godparents, if possible, is held each month. Please call the Parish Office to make arrangements.

Confirmation

preparation begins in the middle of 7th grade and is celebrated during the winter of 8th grade. For adult/high school confirmation, call the Religious Education Office.

The Eucharist

is brought to the homebound by Care Ministers. Arrangements are made by calling Lori Goszczynski. First Eucharist preparation for children begins in 1st grade and is celebrated in the spring of 2nd grade.

Matrimony

arrangements are made by contacting one of the priests at the Parish Office. Arrangements a year in advance allow for adequate reservation time, participation in marriage preparation programs and liturgical planning.

Anointing of the Sick

is celebrated in the Fall during a communal celebration. Special requests for this sacrament can be arranged by calling the Parish Office.

Reconciliation
