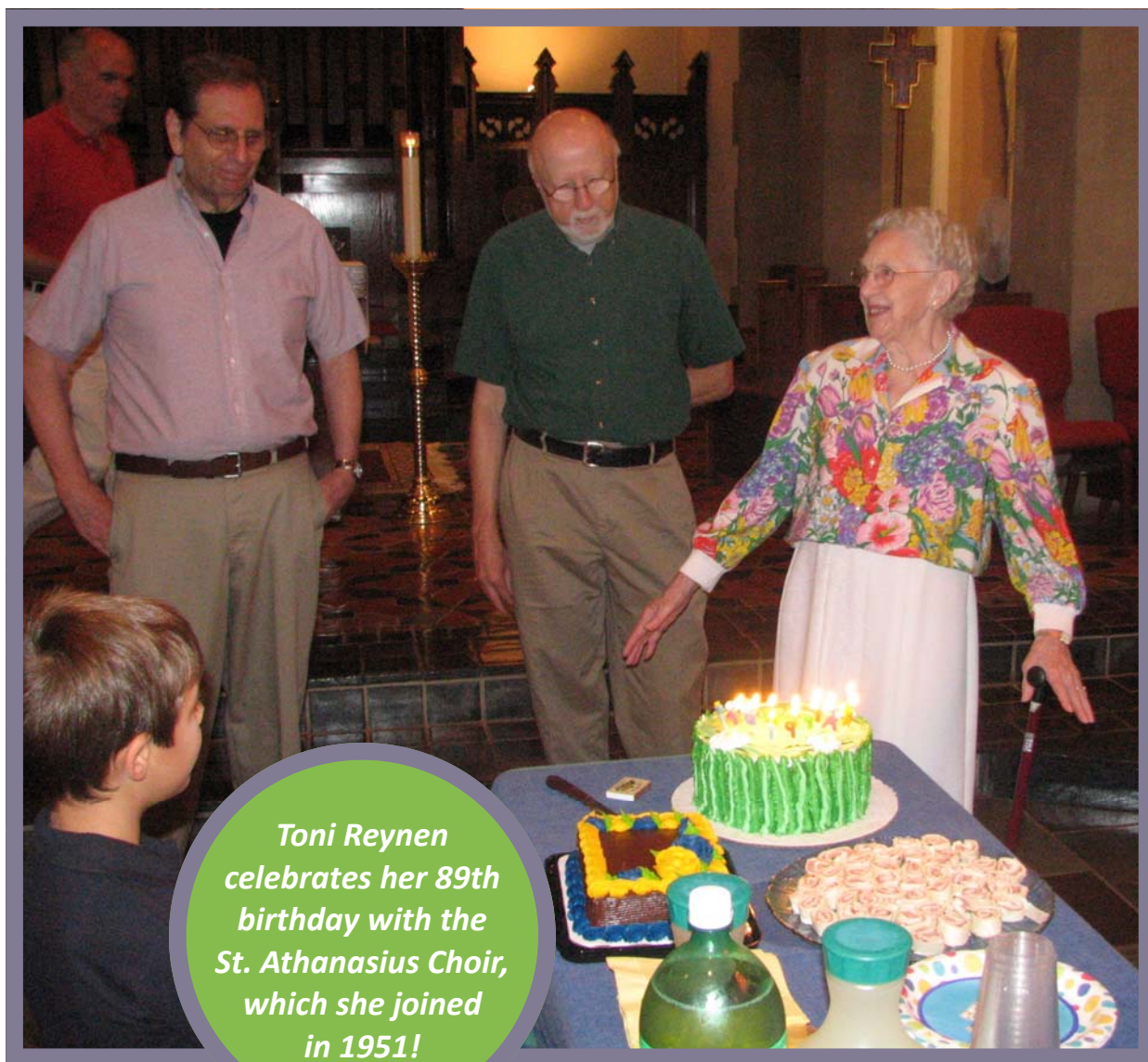

Carmelite Missionary Appeal

Next Sunday a second collection will be taken for the missionary work done by Carmelite Fathers in many parts of the underdeveloped world, especially in Peru, Brazil, Mexico, Indonesia, the Philippines and Zimbabwe, Africa.

In Sicuani, Peru, in one of the most remote areas of the Southern Andes mountains, Carmelites care for an entire diocese. The Ordinary is Bishop Michael La Fay, O.Carm. His people live in the midst of extreme poverty: 90% suffer from malnutrition, 80% have TB and one out of three children die before his/her first birthday. The life expectancy of everyone is only 35 years!

Carmelites in Sicuani and in those other places must feed the hungry, attend the sick, and provide schools and other services to their pain-filled people, as they proclaim the Good News of God's loving kindness.

Jesus promised an eternal reward to those who would give even a cup of cold water to the poor in His Name. Your generosity in the collection for Carmelite Missions next weekend will allow Bishop La Fay and so many other Carmelites to give their people much more than a cup of cold water. The Lord will indeed reward you - as only He can!

Church Tours Begin This Sunday, August 8

Part of our Catholic heritage is the richness of symbols in our art and architecture. A beautiful church like St. Athanasius not only enriches our worship experience, it offers us constant teaching. On August 8 our newly formed Docent group will begin offering mini-tours of various aspects of the church several times a month after different Masses. The tours will be about fifteen minutes in length and appropriate for parishioners of all ages.

Our first tour on Sunday, August 8, following the 11:30 am and 5:00 pm Masses, will feature the north window behind the altar, illustrating the life and death of Jesus and his gift of the Eucharist, and the great south window in the choir loft, celebrating the life of Mary. If you would like to “zoom in” on details, we suggest that you bring opera glasses or binoculars.

Our next mini-tour will follow the 9:30 am Mass on Sunday, August 22 and will feature the Altar and Sacristy. Learn about the significance of the sacred vessels and the priestly vestments used in the celebration of the Mass.

Update from Clara Hoag

I flew back into Chicago last Thursday; what a culture shock! It's a bit unnerving to be back in the States. I got used to living without technology, close to the land, in a small family community. I imagine I have a long life of traveling ahead of me though. In the following years I hope to be involved in the opening of new facilities all over the world!

During my time in the Dominican Republic, I made hundreds of filters, built a kiln in Haiti, learned how to throw on a wheel, and wrote a training manual. (It is 55 pages long and has well over 100 hand drawn illustrations in it.)

I learned so much during my time in the Dominican Republic. I have gained a new appreciation for clay, art, Latin American culture, and community. I have become a better listener, student, and teacher. I am more aware of how important sustainability and accountability are for the future of our planet. And, most importantly, I have a better understanding of how complex, confusing, and inter-related global issues can be. I would not trade my time in the Dominican Republic for anything on earth.

Gospel for August 15, 2010

Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Lk 1: 39-56

Mary set out and traveled to the hill country in haste to a town of Judah, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the infant leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, cried out in a loud voice and said, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For at the moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."

And Mary said: "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed: the Almighty has done great things for me and holy is his Name. He has mercy on those who fear him in every generation. He has shown the strength of his arm, and has scattered the proud in their conceit. He has cast down the mighty from their thrones, and has lifted up the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent away empty. He has come to the help of his servant Israel for he has remembered his promise of mercy, the promise he made to our fathers, to Abraham and his children forever."

Mary remained with her about three months and then returned to her home.

- How does that speak to our community at St. Athanasius? And to the wider Church?

Working with the Scriptures

August 8, 2010 (Lk. 12:32-48; Heb. 11:1-2, 8-19)

“For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be.”

Maggie and Ted had to make a decision. Together they faced the difficult task of having to decide which of three events, all happening on the same day, they would attend. One was the Memorial Service for Ted’s brother-in-law’s father, the second was Maggie’s niece’s wedding reception, and the third was the Baptism of the baby of good friends. It was a difficult choice because Ted and Maggie truly treasure all of these people and their hearts are with each one of them. Obviously, however, they could not be in three places at once. How to choose?

In the end, the couple decided that they could attend one event in the early afternoon and one later in the day. Unfortunately, since two were in the afternoon, they still had to decide which one to let go of. The Memorial Service? Or the Baptism? They finally decided to give preference to family and attend the Memorial Service and the wedding reception, even though they love all of these people and could just as easily have chosen the Baptism.

Abraham had to make a similar choice. He loved His God – but he also loved his son. How to choose? His son? Or his God? Where was his treasure? Surely his heart was torn. But then God did what God so often does when we choose God over other treasure – God allowed him to keep them both! Think about people who choose to live more simply because they value the environment. Often they find that their life is actually richer than before because focusing on what they treasure has shifted their heart. Or consider writers and artists who choose to live their creativity, even though doing so means that they must let go of the prevailing consumer mentality of much of the corporate world.

This weekend Maggie and Ted decided to follow their hearts, grateful for having been gifted with so many treasures. And God continued to do what God does – their friends have promised to send them pictures from the Baptism!

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

is a several-month process for an adult wishing to become a Catholic through the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) or through a Profession of Faith. These rites are celebrated at the Easter Vigil. Please contact Fr. Rich Sztorc.

Infant Baptism

is generally celebrated on the first and third Sundays of the month at 1:00 pm in the Church. The Baptism Preparation Program for parents and godparents, if possible, is held each month. Please call the Parish Office to make arrangements.

Confirmation

preparation begins in the middle of 7th grade and is celebrated during the winter of 8th grade. For adult/high school confirmation, call the Religious Education Office.

The Eucharist

is brought to the homebound by Care Ministers.

Arrangements are made by calling Lori Goszczynski. First Eucharist preparation for children begins in 1st grade and is celebrated in the spring of 2nd grade.

Matrimony

arrangements are made by contacting one of the priests at the Parish Office. Arrangements a year in advance allow for adequate reservation time, participation in marriage preparation programs and liturgical planning.

Anointing of the Sick

is celebrated in the Fall during a communal celebration. Special requests for this sacrament can be arranged by calling the Parish Office.

Reconciliation

is celebrated on Saturdays, after the 8:15 am Eucharist until 9:30 am, in the sacristy near the front doors of the Church during the Holy Hour. Communal Reconciliation Services are held during Advent and Lent.
