## Gospel for February 14, 2010 Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time Luke 6:17, 20-26

Jesus came down with the twelve and stood on a stretch of level ground with a great crowd of his disciples and a large number of the people from all Judea and Jerusalem and the coastal region of Tyre and Sidon. And raising his eyes toward his disciples he said:

"Blessed are you who are poor, for the kingdom of God is yours. Blessed are you who are now hungry, for you will be satisfied. Blessed are you who are now weeping, for you will laugh. Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude and insult you, and denounce your name as evil on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice and leap for joy on that day! Behold, your reward will be great in heaven. For their ancestors treated the prophets in the same way.

"But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation. Woe to you who are filled now, for you will be hungry. Woe to you who laugh now, for you will grieve and weep. Woe to you when all speak well of you, for their ancestors treated the false prophets in this way."

## Scripture Question of the Week

Jesus speaks to an ever growing crowd of disciples and continues to insist on the blessing of poverty – in both the material and spiritual sense. Today this message is even more counter-cultural than when He first delivered it. Few people seek suffering and want, but when it is our lot in life, Jesus tells us that our grace-filled acceptance, patience and contentment will be rewarded. How can I be more grateful this week for whatever I have? How can I be more compassionate to others?

## Focus on Leadership

The leadership side of our program is as important as the educational part. We want our young women, once they are out in the world, to have more than just a degree; we want them to have a new way of thinking. The ultimate mission of Casa Isabel and CDC is service based leadership formation. We need leaders who are placed in authority by the people because of their love, willingness to serve, dedication, and character. We also need an understanding that leaders do not necessarily need to be in positions of political power. The first step for the younger girls is to understand themselves better, their gifts, talents, strengths, and shortcomings. For more information on servant leadership, a good first read is *The Servant* by James Hunter.

## Focus on Service

Another part of the program is to teach the students that they are always in a position to give back to their communities. They do not have to have immense resources or an excess of wealth before they give something in return. We have three projects in motion here at Casa Isabel. The first is a recycling project. None of the towns in this region have a recycling program. We contacted a company in a neighboring town that collects plastic bottles for recycling. It is quite sad how many soda bottles are just lying on the streets or along the highways and riverbanks. We collect them, put them in large bags, and then the company comes and picks them up and takes them to a recycling plant in Puebla. Our second project is the radio show that our students give weekly. They prepare a topic and present it on Saturday mornings for an hour. One of our students, Aurora, loves the project and has taken the younger students in hand and picks out the topics each week. They still need guidance in organizing the themes, but they are getting good at research. The final project we have is tutoring. Several of our older students spend time in the afternoon tutoring local grade school students, giving individual help on homework or skill development. Our small library helps us to provide reading material for the students. We can't lend out the books, but the kids can read (and be read to) when they are here. We also have board games to play with the kids as a reward for their hard work. Each student at Casa Isabel chooses an area in which they want to focus and dedicates about three to six hours a week on their chosen projects.



## More Building for the New Year



We are very quickly developing our new property, much faster than I anticipated. In May we moved onto the new property, having remodeled the building from a one room warehouse to a three bedroom home. One of our board members found funding to cover an area outside so that we would have more space to move around, especially in the rainy season. We found out very quickly that we needed a covered place to hang clothes to dry. All three bedrooms were strung with clothes wires for several weeks! We had to make some adjustments; we moved from a four bedroom house to a three bedroom and then increased the number of students from six to seven. By American

standards, ten people in a three bedroom home is a bit tight, and I must admit that sharing a bedroom with my two daughters is somewhat stressful. Although all of my students come from two-room homes that all have six to eight people living in them, everyone was pleased when we were awarded a grant to complete the second floor of the building. We will be adding four bedrooms, a study area and two more bathrooms. Downstairs, I will have a separate room for my girls, as well as a room for the computers and library. Now we will have room for up to sixteen students! Before we can expand the program, however, we will need the funds to support the students, and I will need a volunteer to help with all the work.

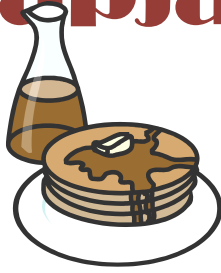

## Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes on February 11

The Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes in southern France is the most visited pilgrimage site in the world; built where the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to a poor, 14-year old girl named Bernadette Soubiroux, when she and her friends had gone to gather firewood. The first apparition occurred on February 11, 1858, and was followed by 17 more apparitions until the last one on July 16, 1858. No one except Bernadette ever saw or heard any of the apparitions. The mysterious vision Bernadette saw in the hollow of the rock Massabielle was that of a young and beautiful lady, who occasionally spoke to Bernadette. She said the Lady "wore a white dress, an equally white veil, a blue belt and a yellow rose on each foot."

At the 9th apparition, the Lady told the girl to drink of a mysterious fountain within the grotto itself, the existence of which was previously unknown, and of which there was no sign. Bernadette scratched at the dirt, and a spring immediately bubbled up and soon gushed forth. At the 13th apparition, the Lady told Bernadette to tell the priests she wished a chapel to be built on the spot and processions to be made to the grotto. The Parish Priest of Lourdes wanted to know the Lady's name, and demanded another sign, to see the wild rose bush flower at the Grotto in the middle of the winter. After the 16th apparition, Bernadette reported that the Lady told her, "I am the Immaculate Conception". Though the girl was unfamiliar with the term, the Pope had declared the doctrine of the immaculate conception of the Virgin Mary in 1854.

Four years after Bernadette's visions, in 1862, the bishop of the diocese declared the faithful "justified in believing the reality of the apparition" of Our Lady. A basilica was built upon the rock of Massabielle by M. Peyramale, the parish priest. In 1873 the great "national" French pilgrimages were inaugurated. Three years later, the basilica was consecrated and the statue solemnly crowned. In 1883, the foundation stone of another church was laid, as the first was no longer large enough. It was built at the foot of the basilica and was consecrated in 1901 and called the Church of the Rosary. Pope Leo XIII authorized a special office and a Mass, in commemoration of the apparition, and in 1907 Pius X extended the observance of this feast to the entire Church. It is now observed on February 11.

## Working with the Scriptures

February 7, 2010 (Isa. 6:3-8; Lk. 5:1-11)

“Put out into deep water and lower your nets for a catch.”

I heard on the news this morning that unemployment in our nation is currently at 9%. While this is down 1% from the previous 10%, it is certainly anything but good. Or is it? One young man I know had always wanted to teach scuba diving. The only problem was that he was working as a computer analyst in a midwestern city, hundreds of miles from the nearest ocean. That is, until he lost his job. Then, like many of the unemployed, he spent hours every day writing and rewriting his resume, describing his training and skills as a computer analyst in glowing terms. But no job offers came. That's when he decided to "...put out into [the] deep water..." of his God-given passions and desires to see what he really felt called to do. That's when he decided to leave his apartment and winter clothing behind and move to Florida, where he took the scuba diving courses he had always dreamed of taking. Today that young man is working as a scuba diving instructor, taking groups of people (many of whom are from the Midwest!) "...out into deep water..." to follow their heart's desire.

No doubt about it, unemployment can be ugly. But unemployment can also offer a person the opportunity to take a second look at how they might use their gifts in new ways. Unemployment can give people the chance to do the volunteer service they had never had time to do before. Unemployment can provide the time to take advantage of the many government programs available and go back to school. Some might choose to continue in their chosen field – taking courses designed to give them additional skills and, therefore, additional value to a future employer. Others might choose to do something entirely different; to explore areas they had previously thought about but had never had the time or opportunity to pursue.

## Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

is a several-month process for an adult wishing to become a Catholic through the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) or through a Profession of Faith. These rites are celebrated at the Easter Vigil. Please contact Fr. Rich Sztorc.

## Infant Baptism

is generally celebrated on the first and third Sundays of the month at 1:00 pm in the Church. The Baptism Preparation Program for parents and godparents, if possible, is held each month. Please call the Parish Office to make arrangements.

## Confirmation

preparation begins in the middle of 7th grade and is celebrated during the winter of 8th grade. For adult/high school confirmation, call the Religious Education Office.

## The Eucharist

is brought to the homebound by Care Ministers. Arrangements are made by calling Lori Goszczynski. First Eucharist preparation for children begins in 1st grade and is celebrated in the spring of 2nd grade.

## Matrimony

arrangements are made by contacting one of the priests at the Parish Office. Arrangements a year in advance allow for adequate reservation time, participation in marriage preparation programs and liturgical planning.

## Anointing of the Sick

is celebrated in the Fall during a communal celebration. Special requests for this sacrament can be arranged by calling the Parish Office.

## Reconciliation

is celebrated on Saturdays, after the 8:15 am Eucharist until 9:30 am, in the sacristy near the front doors of the Church during the Holy Hour. Communal Reconciliation Services are held during Advent and Lent.
