Center for Interchange and Solidarity in El Salvador (CIS)

This organization in San Salvador, El Salvador, works for human rights, fair elections, education and relief of poverty. CIS was founded in 1993 after the signing of the peace accords that ended that country's civil war. The group seeks to achieve structural changes to confront the economic and social injustices that were the root causes of the war. CIS provides international observer missions to monitor El Salvadoran elections, promotes cultural exchanges to strengthen understanding of Salvadoran history and culture, and encourages development and sale of Salvadoran crafts made by women, youths and ex-combatants in cooperatives. El Salvador, remembered for its tragic history, is the country where a government soldier killed Archbishop Romero while he was saying Mass at the hospital chapel because of his support of the poor. Your contribution can extend the resources of CIS and thus expand its ability to carry out its mission.

Connections for the Homeless

Connections for the Homeless is based in Evanston and serves the greater Northern Cook County area. Its mission includes Hilda's Place, a transition shelter, the Incline Program for adults with special needs and several Prevention Programs for at-risk families. Founded in 1984 by an interfaith group of community activists, Connections moves people out of the shadows of homelessness not only by providing shelter, but also programs that address the most common barriers to reaching self-sufficiency. Connections has built collaborative partnerships with critical public, private and nonprofit agencies that are committed to our community.

Jesus came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there. Jesus, tired from his journey, sat down there at the well. It was about noon.

A woman of Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" (For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.) Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir, you do not even have a bucket and the cistern is deep; where then can you get this living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us this cistern and drank from it himself with his children and his flocks?" Jesus answered and said to her, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water."

Jesus said to her, "Go call your husband and come back." The woman answered and said to him, "I do not have a husband." Jesus answered her, "You are right in saying, 'I do not have a husband.' For you have had five husbands, and the one you have now is not your husband. What you have said is true." The woman said to him, "Sir, I can see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain; but you people say that the place to worship is in Jerusalem." Jesus said to her, "Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem.

You people worship what you do not understand; we worship what we understand, because salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth; and indeed the Father seeks such people to worship him. God is Spirit, and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and truth." The woman said to him, "I know that the Messiah is coming, the one called the Christ; when he comes, he will tell us everything." Jesus said to her, "I am he, the one speaking with you."

At that moment his disciples returned, and were amazed that he was talking with a woman, but still no one said, "What are you looking for?" or "Why are you talking with her?" The woman left her water jar and went into the town and said to the people, "Come see a man who told me everything I have done. Could he possibly be the Christ?" They went out of the town and came to him. Meanwhile, the disciples urged him, "Rabbi, eat." But he said to them, "I have food to eat of which you do not know." So the disciples said to one another, "Could someone have brought him something to eat?" Jesus said to them, "My food is to do the will of the one who sent me and to finish his work. Do you not say, 'In four months the harvest will be here'? I tell you, look up and see the fields ripe for the harvest. The reaper is already receiving payment and gathering crops for eternal life, so that the sower and reaper can rejoice together. For here the saying is verified that 'One sows and another reaps.' I sent you to reap what you have not worked for; others have done the work, and you are sharing the fruits of their work."

Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in him because of the word of the woman who testified, "He told me everything I have done." When the Samaritans came to him, they invited him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. Many more began to believe in him because of his word, and they said to the woman, "We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world."



After reading the Gospel aloud, in unison, those gathered reflect on the following questions:

- In this passage, what word, phrase or image struck you?
- How does that speak to you personally?
- How does that speak to our community at St. Athanasius? And to the wider Church?

*Conclude by praying the **Our Father** together.*

This Sunday, February 28, at our 9:30 am Liturgy, our parish community will participate in the Rite of Sending RCIA Candidates for Recognition by the bishop at Holy Name Cathedral. This celebration offers the local community the opportunity to express its support of these candidates who seek full communion in the Catholic Church and sends them forth to the Celebration of Election on Sunday afternoon assured of our care and support. We at St. Athanasius have accompanied these RCIA participants since last September and rejoice now with **Jamie Andersen** and **Cole Rowland** as they take this next step on their journey of faith..

As they present themselves at the Cathedral, the Book of the Elect in which they have inscribed their names during our 9:30 am Liturgy, will be presented to Bishop Gustavo, who, in the name of the larger Roman Catholic Church, elects them to participate in the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist at Easter. Working with the Scriptures

Feb. 28, 2010 (*Phil. 3:17-4:1*)

“[A]nd observe those who thus conduct themselves...” In this portion of his letter to the Philippians, we don’t hear a lot about what positive characteristics we are to observe in followers of Christ, but Paul certainly does give us a couple of good examples of what characteristics we are NOT to imitate. “Their God is their stomach.” What a wonderful reminder for us as we enter this second full week of Lent! In a fast-food culture where ‘super-sizing’ seems to be the norm, fasting reminds us that we must not let our stomach become our god. But what about eating too little? A great deal continues to be written about models who are unhealthily thin because fashion dictates that there must not be an ounce of fat anywhere on their bodies. “Observe...”

Paul goes on to say that “...their glory is in their ‘shame’.” Have you checked out the lead stories on the news these days? Reporters scramble to keep up with the indiscretions of sports figures and politicians and even in death the exploits of certain rock stars are glorified. On the other hand, it’s a rare publication that features a celebrity’s long and faithful marriage. Unfortunately, in an economy that’s largely driven by profit, it would seem that glorifying time-tested family values just doesn’t sell!

Paul tells us that Jesus wishes to “...change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body...” Did Paul mean that we should all wear flowing robes and float about a foot off the ground? Not at all. In fact, we are ALREADY Christ’s body. What Paul is trying to point out to us is what it would look like if we lived out of that reality. How would we relate to food if we looked at food as God looks at it? Do we use food to *sustain* our life or do we allow food to *control* our life? When we look at the people whom the media glorifies what values do we observe? On what do we model our lives? Paul chooses to “...stand firm in the Lord.” Where do we choose to stand?

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

is a several-month process for an adult wishing to become a Catholic through the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) or through a Profession of Faith. These rites are celebrated at the Easter Vigil. Please contact Fr. Rich Sztorc.

Infant Baptism

is generally celebrated on the first and third Sundays of the month at 1:00 pm in the Church. The Baptism Preparation Program for parents and godparents, if possible, is held each month. Please call the Parish Office to make arrangements.

Confirmation

preparation begins in the middle of 7th grade and is celebrated during the winter of 8th grade. For adult/high school confirmation, call the Religious Education Office.

The Eucharist

is brought to the homebound by Care Ministers. Arrangements are made by calling Lori Goszczynski. First Eucharist preparation for children begins in 1st grade and is celebrated in the spring of 2nd grade.

Matrimony

arrangements are made by contacting one of the priests at the Parish Office. Arrangements a year in advance allow for adequate reservation time, participation in marriage preparation programs and liturgical planning.

Anointing of the Sick

is celebrated in the Fall during a communal celebration.

Special requests for this sacrament can be arranged by calling the Parish Office.

Reconciliation

is celebrated on Saturdays, after the 8:15 am Eucharist until 9:30 am, in the sacristy near the front doors of the Church during the Holy Hour. Communal Reconciliation Services are held during Advent and Lent.
